

Sports Premium 2022-2023

What is the Sports Premium?

The Government has provided specific sports funding since 2013 and continues to do so for the current academic year. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and the funding goes directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all of their children.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

What is the funding for?

Schools will have to spend the sport funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding could be:

- hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers when teaching PE
- new or addition Change4Life sports clubs
- paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- providing cover to release primary teachers for CPD in development in PE/sport
- running sports competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE/sport
- providing places for pupils on after school sports clubs
- buying equipment which will widen the range of sports activities undertaken.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport they offer. There are 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement across:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

How do we spend the Sports Funding at Brackenhill, and who benefits?

At Brackenhill, the governors, Senior Leadership Team and Teaching staff all agree that the money must be used so that: all children benefit, regardless of their sporting ability; that all children are given the opportunity to compete in tournaments and competitions with other schools; that children have access to a varied range of sports and activities; that staff have access to training opportunities and CPD.

In the academic year 2022-2023 we were allocated £16,000 plus £3,370 for £10 per pupil. Brackenhill received £11,299 in November 2022 and received £8,071 in May 2023.

Throughout the year	Sports UK	£3070.50	1 and 3	Sports UK have worked with the school to adapt the PE curriculum to meet the needs of the pupils in school. This has been trialled this year and will be rolled out fully I'm September in 2023. Children have undertaken unfamiliar sports and CPD has been provided for staff leading to increased confidence when teaching PE.
Throughout the year	After school sports clubs delivered by staff	£3000	2 and 5	Upon entry to Brackenhill, most children are working well below national curriculum expectations. There is limited opportunity for sports outside of school as many families don't prioritise sports due to the cost of living and attending religious activities after school. As we value sport at Brackenhill, opportunities are provided through after school clubs for children to experience a variety of sports. Due to increased engagement with this club, other more specialised sports have been offered and professionals brought in to deliver these sessions. Children's confidence has increased and they are now starting to participate in competitions with other schools.
October 2022	African Dance workshops	£980	1, 3 and 4	Children were able to widen their understanding and skills of the PE curriculum by being taught by a specialist dance coach. As culture is one of the key drivers within the whole school curriculum, pupils were able to benefit from exploring a key part of African culture. This was a memorable experience that developed pupil engagement with dance resulting in increased numbers of pupils wanting to attend the school dance club.
April 2023- July 2023	Additional swimming lessons	£3,036	3	Due to the current data at the end of Key Stage 2, swimming has been identified as an area for development. Additional lessons

				have been provided to help pupils to catch up due to reduced opportunities for swimming during the pandemic. Brackenhill has a large number of children from BAME backgrounds. Statistically less than 1% of competitive swimmers with Swim England identify as BAME with fear of drowning or injury being the main driver for this. Many pupils come from families where swimming is not pursued at home and parents are worried about sending their children swimming.
June 2022	Bollywood Dance workshops	£650	1, 3 and 4	Children were able to widen their understanding and skills of the PE curriculum by being taught by a specialist dance coach. As culture is one of the key drivers within the whole school curriculum, pupils were able to benefit from exploring a key part of African culture. This was a memorable experience that developed pupil engagement with dance resulting in increased numbers of pupils wanting to attend the school dance club.
June 2023- July 2023	After school coaching - football	£376.50	2 and 5	In partnership with Bradford Park Avenue, where children have the opportunity to learn the skills and receive coaching from a qualified football coach. Children's confidence has increased and they are now starting to participate in competitions with other schools.
June 2023- July 2023	Afterschool coaching – Martial arts and boxing	£346.50	2 and 4	Children with SEND are sometimes unable to access clubs due the pace of the activity in other clubs. As a result, this club has been used to target pupils with SEND. This is supporting pupils with their sensory needs and helping them to self-regulate.
July 2022	Celebration Day	£4000	4	The Knockout Challenge created an inflatable assault course which all children could participate within. Children were able to take part and celebrate their achievement of the academic year. Children were able to compete against people within the class, but also earn points for their house. Our new reception cohort were able to access this activity and develop their gross motor skills.

July 2022	Year 6 sports celebrations	£820	4	Children are exposed to sports that school are unable to provide such as laser tag and bowling. From a deprived area, some children may not often experience days like this due to the expense of the day. Children were able to widen their experience by providing them with an ever-lasting memory from primary school.
July 2023	Sports Day	£650	3, 4 and 5	A specialist sports company has delivered sports' day this year to enable pupils to be exposed to new sports. Children experienced a variety of new sports and these were led by trained coaches. Children were able to compete against each other for their houses and develop sportsman like behaviour.
July 2023	Inclusion equipment for PE for children who can't access mainstream PE	£913	5	Due to increasing needs of pupils, provision has been adapted to support these pupils in accessing PE to help regulate and meet their sensory needs. Pupils fine and gross motor skills have improved and they have increasing levels of confidence when undertaking sports activities.
July 2023	PE equipment	£500	2 and 3	New equipment has been provided to support pupils with staying active during break and lunchtimes. Pupils have responsibility for their equipment and this will be developed further next year with sports leaders leading activities.
July 2023	EYFS celebration event	£500	4	Children were able to take part and celebrate their achievement of the academic year. Children were able to compete against people within the class and earn points for their houses. This supported pupils in developing and applying skills they have learnt this year and develop confidence when using apparatus.

Swimming proficiency for Year 6 at Brackenhill Primary School July 2023

Swimming has been affected due to covid-19 and building work at the swimming baths used by the school, this has meant 2 cohorts have had to have a reduced number of lessons over the last couple of years. Once swimming recommenced. Bradford Council stated each child only need 6-8 hours to pass their national curriculum. This has reflected on our pass rate. Bradford Council did not provide us with any availability for catch up lessons. We sourced lessons this year at the swim academy to provide some catch up opportunity, however there has not been sufficient time to make any inroads with this. Next year, swimming will be back on a normal timetable and pupils will have a significantly increased amount of lessons.
